


Message from the publisher

I'm writing this message having just seen the finale of *Canada Reads*. Our little press published *Homes: A Refugee Story*—winner of the audience vote and one of the final two contenders on the show. The *Canada Reads* debates reminded us of the difference that books can make in the world and the importance of what we have published. And they made us look forward to what is coming up! We are very excited to present our Fall 2019 list:

First up is *Agnes, Murderess* by Sarah Leavitt, an internationally-acclaimed cartoonist and the author of *Tangles* (2010), the first work of graphic literature to be a finalist for the Writers' Trust Non-Fiction Prize. *Agnes, Murderess* is a graphic novel based on the legends of the Cariboo Region of BC and a roadhouse owner who is rumoured to have murdered over fifty people in the mid- to late-nineteenth century.

We also have two fast-paced novels on our roster. *This Has Nothing to Do with You* by Lauren Carter is a dramatic page-turner set in Northern Ontario. It is about two siblings coming to terms with a murder committed by their mother. *The Towers of Babylon* by Michelle Kaeser is a darkly hilarious novel. Told in four voices, it tracks a group of hapless Millennials trying to find meaning in a world that that may well be inching toward decline.

Freehand has now entered our second decade, and we are so excited about what's to come.


Internationally acclaimed cartoonist Sarah Leavitt has created a Gold Rush story like no other

Agnes, Murderess is a graphic novel inspired by the bloody legend of Agnes McVee, a roadhouse owner, madam and serial killer in the Cariboo region of British Columbia in the mid-nineteenth century.

In Sarah Leavitt's story, Agnes's life begins on an isolated island off the coast of Scotland where she lives with her terrifying grandmother, Gormul, who is determined to have an heir to her land and her evil powers. Agnes escapes to London, then on to British Columbia, settling in 108 Mile in the Cariboo region. Here, she assumes ownership of a roadhouse serving the Gold Rush Trail. But no matter how far into the wild she ventures, she can't seem to rid herself of Gormul, who haunts both her dreams and her waking life.

Leavitt puts a decidedly queer twist on the story, moving from women's passionate friendships in the gardens of St John's Wood to cross-dressing in the Cariboo. At the same time, the book grapples with the colonizer's dangerous belief that Canada is a "new world," free of ghosts and history. *Agnes, Murderess* presents a tortured, complicated woman struggling to escape her past. It is a spine-chilling tale of ghosts and murder, friendship and betrayal, love and greed, fate and choice.

SARAH LEAVITT has earned international acclaim as a writer and cartoonist. Her first book, Tangles: A story about Alzheimer's, my mother, and me, was published in Canada, the US, UK, Germany, France and Korea and a feature-length animation is in development. In 2010, it became the first work of graphic literature to be a finalist for the Writers' Trust Non-Fiction Prize and was also a Globe and Mail Top 100 Book of 2010. Her prose and comics have appeared in anthologies, magazines and newspapers in Canada, the US and the UK. Sarah teaches comics classes in the Creative Writing Program at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

A snapshot of a civilization past its prime

Embracing the anxieties of contemporary urban life, *The Towers of Babylon* tracks a group of hapless Millennials trying to find meaning in a world that consistently rejects them. As the novel's four narrators pinball around Toronto—where real estate prices are hyper-inflated, public infrastructure is crumbling, and climate change is bringing on killer heat and savage storms—they each try to do what's right for themselves and for the world. Trouble is, none of them can agree on what right means.


There's chronically unemployed and accidentally pregnant Joly; her best friend Louise, a billboard marketing genius in moral crisis; Joly's boyfriend Ben, a communist/Anglican hybrid with a big heart and big hopes and a big reservoir of anger; and Yannick, Joly's brother, a private equity hotshot, overworked and overburdened and trying to shake off an encroaching depression with brute will.

The Towers of Babylon looks at a generation struggling professionally, personally, and spiritually—to carve out their place in a civilization that may well be inching toward decline.

A compulsively readable novel about two siblings coming to terms with a murder committed by their mother

The morning after her high school graduation, Mel and her older brother Matt find out that their mother has murdered their father. *This Has Nothing to Do With You* is the story of how they come to terms with their mother's destruction of their family and her past that fuelled her actions.

Three years after the murder, Mel has not gone to visit her mother in prison—and there isn't much hope that she is going to. After drifting around the continent, living in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside, and then in a cave in Arizona, she has returned to her family and friends in Northern Ontario and is struggling to care for a dog, Grommet, a mastiff with a tragic past who lives with her in a too-small apartment that does not allow pets. Meanwhile Matt, a new parent, is withdrawing from his family, increasingly unable to pull himself away from the news, looking on in horror as the Rwandan genocide unfolds, desperate to do something.

Here is a dramatic page-turner that pays tribute to the bonds that are formed through trauma and grief.


Homes: A Refugee Story follows the life of the al Rabeeah family, who left their home in Iraq in hopes of a safer life. They moved to Homs, Syria. Abu Bakr, one of eight children, was just ten years old when civil war broke out on the streets around him. Homes is a remarkable true account of growing up in a war zone and ultimately finding safety in Canada, told from Abu Bakr's perspective. It is a story that he had a deep-seated desire to share with Canadians.

Winnie Yeung has expertly crafted this story, drawing on countless hours of interviews with Abu Bakr and his family. The result is a beautifully-written, eye-opening book that is both heartbreaking and hopeful. In an interview with CBC books, Yeung reflected on the process of helping to tell the al Rabeeah family's story: "Listening became the thing that I had to learn how to do.... To be able to just sit back and be quiet and let Abu Bakr tell the story that he needed to.... Now I'm realizing that is the best gift that we can give to anyone who's going through any kind of trauma, big or small, just to listen."
