After her mother's sudden death, Karen finds herself back in her childhood home in Nova Scotia for the first time in a decade, acting as full-time caregiver to Kelli, her older sister. 



The new collection from Griffin Poetry Prize-winning poet Billy-Ray Belcourt, NDN Coping Mechanisms: Notes from the Field is a provocative, powerful, and genre-bending new work.

In NDN Coping Mechanisms, Billy-Ray Belcourt aims an anthropological eye at the contours of NDN and queer social worlds to spot the much that is left unsaid when we look only to the mainstream media. In this genre-bending work, Belcourt employs poetry, poetics, prose, and textual art to illuminate the rogue possibilities bubbling up everywhere NDNs are.

Part One examines the rhythms of everyday life, which include the terrible beauty of the reserve, the afterlives of history, and the grammar of anal sex. Part Two experiments with form and practice, putting to use, for example, a mode of documentary poetics that unearths the logics that make and unmake texts like Treaty 8.

NDN Coping Mechanisms: Notes from the Field emerges out of a form of auto/ethnographic sensibility that is at turns campy and playful, jarring and candid, displaying once again the writer's extraordinary craft, guile, and audacity, and the sheer dexterity of his imagination.



BILLY-RAY BELCOURT (he/him) is a writer and academic from the Driftpile Cree Nation. His debut book of poems, *This Wound is a World*, won the 2018 Griffin Poetry Prize and the 2018 Robert Kroetsch City of Edmonton Book Prize, and it was named the Most Significant Book of Poetry in English by an Emerging Indigenous Writer at the 2018 Indigenous Voices Award. It was also a finalist for the Governor General's Literary Award, the Gerald Lampert Memorial Award, and the Raymond Souster Award. It was named by CBC Books as one of the best Canadian poetry collections of the year. Billy-Ray is a Ph.D. student and a 2018 Pierre Elliott Trudeau Foundation Scholar in the Department of English and Film Studies at the University of Alberta. He is also a 2016 Rhodes Scholar and holds a Master's degree in Women's Studies from Wadham College at the University of Oxford.



An honest and unaffected collection of human experiences that deftly tackles themes of grief, loss, missed opportunities, and the pain of letting go.

The stories in Michael Melgaard's poignant debut collection, *Pallbearing*, offer candid snapshots of life in a small town, where the struggle to make ends meet forces people to make desperate choices. In "Little to Lose," a son confronts his mother over the crushing prison of debt created by her gambling addiction. The aging divorcee in "Coming and Going" spends her days in paranoid pursuit of evidence to incriminate her neighbours in the derelict trailer park where she lives. And in "Clarence and Rose," lifelong friends find love after their respective partners die, and then face loss all over again.

With deceptively spare prose that carries outsized emotional weight and pathos, Melgaard brings his characters to life in sharp-edged portraits and alltoo-human dilemmas, creating engaging stories that resonate with honesty and depth, and linger in the imagination. MICHAEL MELGAARD is a writer and editor based in Toronto. His fiction has appeared in *Grain*, the *Puritan*, and the *Antigonish Review*. He was a regular contributor to the *National Post's* book section, and he has written articles and criticism for the *Millions*, *Torontoist*, and *Canadian Notes & Queries*. *Pallbearing* is his first book.

EXCERPT

The coffin was awkward to carry; the weight threw off the pallbearers' balance, and their closeness to each other caused them to walk in a short, shuffle step. Jonathan was surprised by the weight; it seemed heavy, at first, but a few steps later, he wondered if maybe it was actually lighter than it should be. The wood was, after all, quite dense. But by the end she had been so thin, something he then tried not to think about. He decided that he had no basis for comparison. There was no reason to think the coffin was either heavy or light; experientially, it was exactly the weight all coffins he had ever handled weighed.

Jonathan tried to counterbalance by throwing one arm out to the side, but then thought having one arm flapping maybe looked disrespectful. Instead,

he put it across his body and used it to help with the weight. The others struggled too. The natural burial field was riddled with little holes and clods of dirt. He wondered again why they hadn't lifted it up on their shoulders. He was sure that's what they should have done, but it was too late to do anything about it.

Then they were coming up on the hole in the ground. There were wide, canvas straps across it, the straps wrapped around a metal frame so the coffin could rest over the grave. The pallbearers walked on either side and stopped. A pallbearer opposite Jonathan shifted his grip, the coffin rocked and when it stopped, something inside kept moving for a moment. Jonathan tried not to think about that while they lowered the coffin into place.

Benediction

Olivier Dufault Translated by Pablo Strauss





Based on a true story, *Benediction* is a gritty, trenchantly observed tale of fraud and reinvention in the old American West.

In 1907, fifteen-year-old Ernest Dufault left Quebec for Montana, where he passed himself off as an American cowboy named Will James. Over the next few decades, Ernest would become a cattle thief, a soldier, a Hollywood stuntman, and a bestselling and award-winning writer of westerns. The cowbody was so successful an imposter he was later inducted into the Hall of Great Westerners, and his estranged wife would only learn his true identity after his death at fifty, when he bequeathed his entire estate to a man she had never heard of: Ernest Dufault.

In *Benediction*, Ernest's relative Olivier Dufault uncovers the true story of his two years in a Nevada prison for stealing cattle. Using real materials, including letters, telegrams, and court documents, combined with his inimitable novelistic writing, Olivier reconstructs an incredible life where truth and lies were almost indistinguishable.

He is an Honorary Member of PEN International; won the 2017 Amnesty International Australia Media Award, the Diaspora Symposium Social Justice Award, the Liberty Victoria 2018 Empty Chair Award, and the Anna Politkovskaya Award for journalism; and is non-resident Visiting Scholar at the Sydney Asia Pacific Migration Centre (SAPMiC), University of Sydney. He publishes regularly with the *Guardian*, and his writing also features in the *Saturday Paper*, *HuffPost*, *New Matilda*, the *Financial Times*, and the *Sydney Morning Herald*. Boochani is also co-director (with Arash Kamali Sarvestani) of the 2017 feature-length film *Chauka*, *Please Tell Us the Time*, and collaborator on Nazanin Sahamizadeh's play *Manus*. He graduated from Tarbiat Moallem University and Tarbiat Modares University, both in Tehran; and he holds a Master's degree in political science, political geography, and geopolitics.



Twenty years after her sharp, seminal first book, Sex and the City, reshaped the landscape of pop culture and dating, the trailblazing Candace Bushnell delivers a wry and wise new novel on the highs and lows of sex, dating, and friendship after fifty.

Set between the Upper East Side of Manhattan and a country enclave known as The Village, *Is There Still Sex in the City?* gathers Bushnell's signature short, sharp, satirical commentaries on the love and dating habits of middle-aged men and women as they continue to navigate the ever-modernizing world of relationships. EXCERPT

Six months into my retreat, I got a call from Tina Brown. She had a story idea for me. Now that the appropriate time had passed since my divorce, she suggested that I throw myself back into the dating world and write about what it was like to be dating over fifty. I could do internet dating. I could hire a matchmaker . . .

I cut her off.

I don't think so.

I wasn't ready to start dating. But most of all, I didn't want to. I'd been in relationships for nearly thirty-five years. I'd even experienced the full relationship cycle — fall in love, get married, and get divorced.

And now I was supposed to do it all over again? Was engaging in the relationship cycle the only thing

I could do with my life? I thought about the timehonored definition of crazy: Doing the same thing over and over again and hoping for a different result.

It was time to put an end to the cycle. And so I decided for the first time in thirty-four years, to be man-free.

This also meant being sex-free. At this point in my life, I'm not a casual sex person.

I didn't talk about it, of course. The topic of sex—once the source of so much amusement, embarrassment, fear, and joy—rarely came up. My single friends had been single forever and not dating and therefore not getting any, while my married friends were married and dealing with kids and also—I imagined—not getting any.

An epic historical adventure story set in a Jewish shtetl during the final years of the Russian Empire, *The Slaughterman's Daughter* follows Fanny Keismann on her quest to avenge her sister's honour.

When Fanny Keismann turns ten, her father, Grodno's ritual slaughterer, gives her a knife, and she soon develops a talent for her father's trade. But in nineteenth-century Russia, ritual slaughter does not befit a wife and mother, so when it comes time to marry and raise a family, Fanny abandons her work and devotes herself to raising her five children.

When Fanny's older sister's husband disappears, Fanny leaves her own family and sets out for the great city of Minsk in search of her wayward brotherin-law, armed with her old knife and accompanied by Zizek Bershov, who is either a sly rogue or an idiot. Fanny's mission to help her sister turns into a misadventure that threatens the foundations of the Russian Empire. What begins as a family matter in Motol, a peripheral Jewish settlement, breaks the bounds of the shtetl, pits the police against the Czar's army, and upsets the political and social order they all live in.

YANIV ICZKOVITS, born in 1975, has published three novels. His first, *Heartbeat*, was awarded the Haaretz First Book Prize, and his second, *Adam and Sophie*, the Prime Minister's Prize. *The Slaughterman's Daughter* won the Agnon Prize — the first time the award had been granted in ten years. Iczkovits has also won the Ramat Gan Prize for Literary Excellence and the People of the Book Foundation Prize, and it was a finalist for the Sapir Prize. He has a Ph.D. in philosophy from Columbia University and published a book based on his academic work entitled *Wittgenstein's Ethical Thought*. He lives in Tel Aviv with his wife and two daughters.

In Breaking the Ocean, diversity and inclusion specialist Annahid Dashtgard addresses the long-term impacts of exile, immigration, and racism by offering a vulnerable, deeply personal account of her life and work.

Annahid Dashtgard was born into a supportive mixed-race family in 1970s Iran. Then came the 1979 Islamic Revolution, which ushered in a powerful and orthodox religious regime. Her family was forced to flee their homeland, immigrating to a small town in Alberta. As a young girl, Dashtgard was bullied, shunned, and ostracized by both her peers at school and adults in the community. Home offered little respite as her parents were embroiled in their own struggles, exposing the sharp contrasts between her British mother and Persian father.

Determined to break free from her past, Dashtgard created a new identity for herself as a driven young woman who found strength through political activism, eventually becoming a leader in the anti–corporate globalization movement of the late 1990s. But her unhealed trauma was re-activated following the 9/11 terrorist attacks. Suffering burnout, Dashtgard checked out of her life and took the first steps towards personal healing, a journey that continues to this day.

Breaking the Ocean introduces a unique perspective on how racism and systemic discrimination result in emotional scarring and ongoing PTSD. It is a wake-up call to acknowledge our differences, offering new possibilities for healing and understanding through the revolutionary power of resilience. Dashtgard answers the universal questions of what it means to belong, what it takes to become whole, and, ultimately, what is required to create change in ourselves and in society.



ANNAHID DASHTGARD (M.Ed.) is the co-founder of Anima Leadership, a highly respected international consulting company specializing in issues of diversity and inclusion. Previously, she was a leader in the anti–corporate globalization movement, responsible for several national political campaigns and frequently referred to as one of the top activists to watch in the 1990s. She is the host of the podcast series *Breaking the Ocean: Soundwaves of Belonging* and the director of two award-winning documentaries, *Buy-Bye World: The Battle of Seattle* and *Bread*. Her writing has appeared in the *Globe and Mail*, the *Toronto Star*, and *Briarpatch* magazine. Dashtgard lives in Toronto with her husband and children. *Breaking the Ocean* is her first book.

EXCERPT

It is the beginning of September, the first day of school, and the sun is flirting with making an appearance. Butterflies fill my stomach, but in a good way. Today marks my four-year-old daughter's first day of attending the "big school" at the end of our street. She's wearing the robin's-egg-blue dress I bought for her birthday earlier this year with the silver filigree design down the front — an echo of her Middle Eastern roots. My husband Shakil and I leave the house to drop her off together. With her marching gait, laser-beam gaze, and set mouth, she seems fine. Better off than her mama.

I feel alone. The paralyzing isolation I felt during the early years of motherhood has given way to tenuous new connections with many other parents — through daycare, local Facebook groups, and community gatherings — but I'm still off balance. Despite reaching middle age, despite having achieved professional success, despite all the wonderful things and people in my life, this moment undoes me.

The sight of monkey bars and green playing field makes me feel tight and floaty at the same time. I know it's because a part of me was left behind in a place just like this, where I learned that in order to survive I had to make myself disappear. I can't catch my breath. I feel dislocated.

My daughter runs into the play area without a backward glance, and I call her back to give her one last hug. "Enjoy your first day at your new school, Baba. I love you so much," I whisper. I can't tell if it's her or some earlier version of myself that I watch twist and spin away, the past collapsing into the present. All I know is that my daughter's story begins with my story. And my story begins with my people.

An evocative blend of narrative nonfiction, personal memoir, and reportage in the style of Barry Lopez and Annie Dillard, *Surrender* explores the changing landscape of the American West and the outsider ecocultures that have taken root in an era of increasing climatic disruption.

The mid-life crisis handed to Joanna Pocock came in a box marked with one simple word: Montana. With their seven-year-old daughter in tow, Joanna and her husband packed up their house, filled one suitcase each, and left the rhythms of life in England behind for their great adventure in the American West.

Blending personal memoir with insightful reportage, *Surrender* investigates from a multitude of angles the changing landscape of the West and the scavenger, rewilder, and ecosexual communities that have taken root in the Mountain States. Joanna Pocock, the winner of the 2018 Fitzcarraldo Editions Essay Prize, meets incredible characters along the way, such as Finisia Medrano, a transgender rewilder who has been living on the Hoop for many years, and Reverend Teri Ciacchi, a sexologist, priestess of Aphrodite, and holistic spiritual healer in the Living Love Revolution Church.

In the style of Barry Lopez, Annie Dillard, and Eula Biss, *Surrender* explores the outsider cultures of the old American frontier in an era of increasing climatic disruption, rising sea levels, animal extinctions, melting glaciers, and catastrophic wildfires.

JOANNA POCOCK is an Irish-Canadian writer living in London, U.K. Her essays, reviews, and travel pieces have appeared in *Distinctly Montana*, *Litro*, *Sunday Independent*, *Los Angeles Times*, the *Nation*, *Orion*, *Tahoma Literary Review*, and 3:AM, and on the Dark Mountain blog. She was shortlisted for the Barry Lopez Narrative Nonfiction Prize in 2017 and won the 2018 Fitzcarraldo Editions Essay Prize for *Surrender*. She teaches creative writing at the University of the Arts in London and works as a freelance editor for a variety of publishers.

EXCERPT

On the last day of Surrender, I witnessed ten people marry the Earth. Some spat into the ground and lay in the mixture of soil and spittle; others writhed in the dirt; and others still, like Thumbs, had written moving elegies to the planet, outlining the actions they would perform to honour the Earth. One young woman wore a bridal gown and read her vows aloud. She felt she might never meet a human she loved as much as she loved the Earth. Devoting herself to its wellbeing seemed the most sane and loving act she could think of.

After the ceremonies, we gathered to dance. The sun was beating down, and I stood outside the circle under the shade of a Douglas fir. Some of the dancers were ecstatic. Many were naked. There was drumming, chanting. As people scattered in the woods for a last fuck, cuddle, or romp, I realized that what was going on here really was quite radical. What I had been living these five days was not some nostalgic harking after the past, but a desire to imagine and create a different future.

Most ecological movements look back. Some communities model themselves after an agrarian idyll from a hundred and fifty years ago: the life of the homesteader growing their food, keeping goats, making their own soap and keeping bees. Some communitarians go even further back, to our Palaeolithic ancestors with their migration, foraging, replanting of seeds, and brain-tanning hides as their baseline for the Good Life. What all rewilders, offgridders, ancestral skills practitioners, and those seeking to live in harmony with the planet seemed to have in common was a nostalgia for a world that once existed but was now lost.


The striking thing about the ecosex movement is its insistence on looking forward. In their eyes, social change is needed to envision a planet fit to be lived on. Their focus on consent is perhaps necessary for the uncharted waters they are diving into. Nostalgia is replaced by excitement over what the world could be. Who cares what it once was. Ecosexuals are not trying to recreate some lost Eden, but are instead imagining a whole new one with a new kind of society better suited for survival. They all drive cars and most of them rely on technology — a Surrender Facebook page exists — but most of them, though not living off-grid, are concerned with environmental issues. It is an approach that stands out from the others. Unlike so many ecologically based movements, this one is not misanthropic — it celebrates humans, rather than wishing them dead for their ecocidal ways.



The twenty-fourth semi-annual Munk Debate considers whether China poses a threat to the liberal international order.

Increasingly in the West, China is being characterized as a danger to the liberal international order, one that must be overcome through economic, political, technological, and even military means. For those who believe that the policies of the Chinese Communist Party pose a threat to free and open societies, the U.S. and like-minded nations must band together to preserve a rules-based international order. For others, this approach spells disaster; it ignores the history and dynamics propelling China's rise to superpower status. Rather than threatening the post-war order, China is its best, and maybe only, guarantor in an era of declining U.S. leadership, increased regional instability, and slowing global growth.
