Everything changed the night magic disappeared. Under the orders of a ruthless king, maji were killed, leaving Zaclie without a mother and her people without hope.

Now Zaclie has one chance to bring back magic and strike against the monarchy. With the help of a rogue princess, Zaclie must outwit and outrun the crown prince, who is hell-bent on eradicating magic for good.

She's also the kind of girl that parents warn their kids to stay away from: a troublemaker whose many romances are the subject of endless gossip at school. *You don't want to get involved with a girl like that,* they say. So how is it that eighteen-year-old Porus Dumasia has only ever had eyes for her? And how did Zarin and Porus end up dead in a car together, crashed on the side of a highway in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia?

Piper and Sloane are best friends. They grew up together, dress alike, and never do anything without each other. To Sloane, Piper has always been extraordinary: That is, until Piper caught Sloane kissing Piper's boyfriend, Soup—and the next day, Piper is found dead, washed ashore on a beach.




Flo by Kyo Maclear – FSG – 9780374305260 – HC - \$23.50 – Juvenile Fiction – 40 pp. – January 2018




From a crescent moon to a square garden to an octagonal fountain, this breathtaking picture book celebrates the shapes—and traditions—of the Muslim world.



When Anna and her father barely escape from a group of violent thugs, it becomes clear that the family must leave. But how?


The 11th Hour by Kristine Scarrow – Dundurn – 9781459740372– TP - \$12.99 – YA Fiction – 192 pp. – February 2018



At school the next day, the narrator confronts the bully by spinning her "weirdo" obsession with science into an opportunity to find common ground, and maybe help the bully see the world in a new way.



Little Brothers & Little Sisters by Monica Arnaldo – Owlkids – 9781771472951 – HC - \$18.95 – Juvenile Fiction – 32 pp. – April 2018

Little sisters and little brothers all long for the same few things when it comes to their older siblings: a turn to play, a place on the team, a chance to shine. This book starts with four pairs of siblings in and around an apartment complex, each expressing through play and daily life the many gripes and pitfalls of younger siblings. Subtly, the narrative shifts to reflect the good things that come with having an older sibling: a helping hand, a partner in crime, a friend for life.



Look at the Weather by Britta Teckentrup, Trans. Shelley Tanaka – Owlkids – 9781771472869 – HC - \$ 21.95 – Juvenile Nonfiction – 152 pp. – April 2018

When you stop to think about it, weather is incredible: it's whimsical, varied, ever-present, sometimes destructive and other times, beautiful. This immersive illustrated nonfiction book is an invitation for readers to ponder weather and approach it with a newfound sense of understanding, awe, and wonder.




